TANAPEX '81

TAMILNADU PHILATELIC EXHIBITION 24-12-81 to 27-12-81

The fourth State-level Philatelic Exhibition of Tamilnadu is being organised by the Postmaster General, Tamilnadu Circle, from the 24th December 1981 to 27th December 1981. The Exhibition will be known as "TANAPEX-81." The previous State level philatelic Exhibitions were organised in Tamilnadu in 1973, 1975 and 1978.

Venue:

The Venue of the Exhibition is "DHARMA-PRAKASH" on Raja Annamalai Road, Madras-600 034, in the heart of the City of Madras. The spacious halls may accomodate about 500 Philatelic frames. A few stalls may also be allotted to dealers selling Philatelic items during the periods of the exhibition. The rent for each stall will be Rs. 500/- for the duration,

Editorial :

It is really a good sign for the speedy spread of philately in this region that a descision has been taken to start a school of Philately by the Posts and Telegraphs Department at Madras, coinciding it with the Children's Day (Nehru Birth Day,)

The recent publication of an article on stamp collecting in a Tamil Weekly had brought in a number of letters to SIPA from persons all over India, asking numerous questions. They were all really interested in the hobby Most of them were without even the fundamental knowledge of the hobby Individual explanation and publication of articles in the bulletin are of not much use to them. They have to be taught directly

A good number of schools in Madras and elsewhere are having philatelic clubs: still only a few get correct coaching and training in this hobby. This only suggests that even those who are put in-charge of such clubs should be requested to attend the Philatelic workshop along with their school children.

Philately of the modern days with all its diversified subjects can impart abundant knowledge and it needs only to be introduced in the school curriculum as a subject with a special class to teach those interested

SIPA congratulates the PostmasterGeneral, Tamil Nadu circle for his efficacious endevour and offers full co-operation for the success. It also prays starting of such work shops in Madurai, Trichy and Coimbatore in the first stage itself

At our Monthly Meetings:

September: 32 Members were present. Shri Madan Mohan Das gave a display talk on 'SLOGAN CANCELLATION'. He exhorted members to take up the collection which could be started from the waste paper basket and that a fund of knowledge and information could be gained. He also gave a display talk on 'ADVERTISEMENT STATIONERY'.

Shri G. Balakrishna Das narrated his visit to Madurai on the occasion of the opening of Philatelic Bureau there. Apart from him, few other local members displayed their exhibits on that day as an added attraction. Hon'ble Minister for Communications, Shri C. M. Stephen, who inaugurated the function gave a speech on various aspects of Indian Philately and favoured the opening of schools of Philately all over the country.

October: 40 members were present. Shri G. Balakrishna Das narrated how an interview on stamp collecting with him and Shri M. T. Karunakaran came to be published in a popular tamil magazine 'ANANDA VIGADAN'. The article generated a great amount of interest in philately amongst the juniors and more than 700 letters were received both by the Association and the Philatelic bureau evincing interest about the activities of the association. More than 100 persons have already become members.

Shri V. N. S. Rau announced the hosting of Tanapex, by the P&T Dept. in December last week at Dharmaprakash for four days and exhorted the members to participate in large numbers. He requested members to come forward and contribute articles so that a special column for juniors could be introduced in the SIPA Bulletin. Shri G. Madan Mohan Das gave an interesting talk on rhe benefits of becoming member of a stamp society. One could exchange stamps, refer the catalogues. read the books, borrow magazines from the association and benefit from the experience and the advice of senior Philatelists He also opined that by devoting a Saturday evening exclusively for the juniors in a month, the senior philatelists could help them by giving advice regarding; how to mount, write up, what to collect etc.

November: 42 members were present. Shri V. N. S. Rau was in the Chair. The Chairman greated Shri K. C. Veeraraghavan, one of our very active members who had completed 60 years of age and the members present joined in wishing him many more happy returns.

The chairman made a brief speech on the preparations under way for Tanapex-81 and requested members to participate in large number and make it a grand success. He further said that a national level philatelic exhibition would be likely to be held at Bombay in 1982 and in that connection an organising committee was already formed.

Several new members introduced themselves and Shri V. N. S. Rau welcomed them and gave encouragment and advice and requested them to make best use of their membership of the association. Shri K. K. Verma of the Amritsar philatelic club gave a talk on the formation end growth of their club and its activities. He expressed his appreciation of the way in which the SIPA conducted its meeting.

Shri S. D. Kulkarni, postmaster, Anna Road post office gave a detailed talk on the various aspects of Tanapex-81 and requested the association to lend its hand for the success of the exhibition. He narrated his experiences over the decades as to how the same old people continued to be philatelists while others who started collecting stamps left the hobby soon. A workshop on philately was originally started by him when he was at Hyderabad. He was at first ridiculed that only school children from English medium schools were given the opportunity. But the fact was that separate workshops were conducted in Urdu for urdu medium school children and in Telugu for children from Telugu medium schools. After his departure from Hyderabad, one of the leading philatelists in Hyderabad Shri Ganesan took'upon himself the noble task of conducting workshops in philately by contacting various shools regularly. Similarly a workshop would be inaugurated on the 14th November '81, coinciding with the children's day and a number of schools which have registered themselves with the philatelic bureau have been asked to send two students each for the same. Few more such workshops were planned before the Tanapex-81. A novel feature of the Tanapex-81 would be a special section open for competition by the schools. A rolling shield and 3 cash prizes have been instituted to encourage the hobby in schools.

Shri G. Madan Mohan Das made announcements about new issues. He added that on the 14th November on the occation of the children's day, exhibits on Nehru and children would be displayed in the fourth floor of the Anna Road Post office,

ROCKET MAIL

(From the talk of Mr. D. N. Jatia at the meeting of the Astrophilately commission at Lucerne on the 22nd March '81.)

The flight of livestock can be considered as the precursor of the events that followed. like dog Laika's journey into space and thereafter man's landing on the moon. Smith named the rocket after David Ezra. It was specially constructed with wings or stabilising fins on either side having a downward curve, with the tail fin straight. For adequate ventilation, two orifices were provided to permit air into the 'passenger' chamber. It was a fine rocket experiment, first in the world to achieve transportation of animate objects. One of his rocket experiments form Sikkim, fired on September 28, 1935, also carried a cock-bird and missives. The rocket was named SIKKIM and was despatched from the Gangtok Telegraph Office Compound.

On June 9, 1936, when a large area was affected by floods, he tried a telescopic type rocket which could expand or reduce. It contained rice, dal and chillies for the marooned village in Dhapa, east of Calcutta. He used a similar telescopic type of rocket on September 21, 1936, with three compatrments, over another flooded area in the southern suburbs. This rocket had the unique distinction of carrying a live snake that was called "Miss Creepy" and an apple to provide sustenance during her trip. The rocket moved up, leaving a trial of smoke and went out of sight. It later glided down and skimmed over a deep pool before it got into a brushwood. It was retrieved and, on opening, the snake leaped out, while the other contents remained intact. The rocket was named after 'John Winterton'. Those with a scientific bent of mind thought that these rocket experiments of Smith were a stepping stone to future interplanatary travel, and valued the envelopes as token of future progress.

Not content with experiments over flooded areas, Smith carried out his experiments on using rocket as a means of conveying mail across mountainous terrains in Sikkim. The rockets were mostly made up of metal, bulletheaded, streamlined with gliding vanes, and with stabilizing fins. The behaviour of the rockets as they passed through the rarified mountain atmosphere added knowledge to detect faults and errors, and to rectify them. The rockets crossed a wide ravine and negotiated through stiff cross currents and atmospheric pressures. A rocket, shot from the ridge on the

road to Tibet, went into the open sky without a diviation and landed a mile and a quarter away. Two rocket mail firings, carrying in all 370 messages, in this area gave great satisfaction. The Sikkim government and the Maharaja extented a warm support to Smith. Two series of Rocketgram Stamps were released, and as a fitting conclusion to his successful and brilliant achievements in Sikkim, Princess Pemtsidon, daughter of the Maharaja, despatched a rocket on October 4, 1935 with 137 messages from the Gangtok Telegraph Office compound, autographing many of them intended for distant countries.

Smith also celebrated symbolic events and dates by firing rockets. At the request of the Calcutta Press, a special rocket experiment was staged on February 28, 1935. One small and two gigantic (18 feet long and weighing 14 lb. each) rockets were fired. To solemnize the Royal Silver Jubilee Celebration, a ship-toshore rocket was fired on March 23, 1935 at the Diamond Harbour. A coronation Rocket, of about 7 ft, was launched on May 12, 1937. It sped off fast against a stiff upper wind and landed about a mile away. The First Xmas Relief Rocket was a donation from Mrs. Paganini, wife of Dr. Robert Paganini of Switzerland. The lady had great love for the poor. It was fired on the morning of December 25, 1938, and it bore a cachet "Peace on Earth, Goodwill to all men."

At the All India Jamboree Camp (1937) at Delhi, in which 4,000 boy-scouts and girl guides attended, 8 propaganda rockets were altogether fired. On February 3, 1937, 1,500 messages of weicome to the Viceroy and Lord and Lady Baden-Powell were distributed, after a march-past, in two shots. As the scouts collected at the Jamboree, the rockets burst in the air scattering the messages. Lady Baden-Powell, the world's Chief guide, herself fired a Propaganda Rocket on March 2, 1937 at the Bengal Girl Guides Rally, Lady Dorothy Arther, Provincial Guide Commissioner, also fired another rocket. Both together distributed 3,000 messages. Five mail rockets were also fired during the Jamboree. The first one, carried both ordinary as well as official Jamboree covers, while other mail firings carried only Jamboree official covers and cards identifiable by the Jamboree crest printed on the left side of the items in blue, red, gold, and grey. The mail-carrying rockets covered a distance of over a mile and contained mail for all over the world. After the letters

were transported by rocket, they were posted at the Jamboree Post Office. The sale proceeds were allocated to various Scout funds.

Now came train itself, measuring 7 feet 2 inches, to claim that it was the first Rocket Train flight in the world. The successful flight took place on September 22nd 1937. The train was christened after "Herbert E. Barber" and consisted of a control and parcel cabin, a passenger saloon, dining car, and a mail van, all connected. The passengers were Mr. & Mrs. Mousie (Two mice) with a small bottle of brandy to fortify them! The dining car had Long John Wisky (a sample size), packets of tea, cheese and sugar, while the mail van had 200 postcards. This was fired by J. L. Winterton, President of the Indian Airmail Society.

Earlier the same day, a pilot Rocket train called "Eric-Cyn" with three compartments broke away in mid-air. This accident evoked some unfavourable comments. But to Smith it was a boon, for he got an unexpected line of thought from the erratic flight. Eric Cyn with one compartment was re-christened "Boomerang" and, true to its name, after leaving the firing rack for 200 yards, it took a curve to the right and glided back and landed only 25 yards from the rack. The Boomerang effect, hitherto considered impossible, led to many possibilities for exploration and the next Boomerang was indeed a success. It shot forward, turned slowly forming a circle and. while returning towards the firing point on a glide, struck the foliage of a tree. It was found in perfect condition on recovery. The prospect of developing the Boomerang into a weapon for war was the imminent reaction.

Experiments with war Rockets were carried out from September 19, 1939 to September 26, 1941. A complete list of firings is not available; many of the firings did not carry any mail or souvenirs, though many others contained identification marks, dates, inscriptions and Smith's signature. These-experiments were carried out in Fort William and nearby places which had military establishments then, and it is believed they were some what officially sponsored. In all 58 experiments on war rocket's were made, including two on Parachute war Rockets. Two trials of Rocket Photography made at Behala on July 17, 1940 were extremely significant and interesting. The rockets carried a camera and one missive with the primary intention of taking a photograph wile the rocket was in the air. Both attempts were a failure, but provided enough evidences of what the world expected to achieve in this century.

Stephen Smith thus had a dogged perseverence and dedication. His infinite capacity to make advances in rocketry was marvellous. He knew of things to come. It is, however, sad to see all the efforts Smith made to make both ends meet, as he had virtually to beg by selling his souvenirs. Had not Sir David and Lady Ezra come out to help him, many of the flights would not have taken place at all. The fruits of his labour are being reaped to day by his admirers, who were then bold enough and far-sighted to collect the covers, judged from the prices they are fetching to-day.

In the annals of the history of Rocket Mail in India, Mr. Stephen Hector Taylor-Smith will live for ever.

Elite Philatelic Club:

The Chief guest Mr. S. D. He also recalled stalwarts like Bennet, Major Marcoolyn, Colcox, Ashrof, Dr. Nayeem, and last but not least M. G. Pittie and their services to philately.
