March 1982 34 Members were present Mr. S. Ramaswamy was unanimusly elected as the Chairman of the meeting in the absence of both the President and the Vice-President. New issues were announced Mr. A. Both Mr. & Mrs. Ramanujam, appealed to the members to make the monthly classes being held at the Association office, a success by making a large attendance. But now it had assumed so much of importance and gained recognition even by the conservative countries like UK that thematic issues had become the order of the day and there was no dearth of material for collectors pursuing any of their pet themes.

INTRODUCTION TO THEMATIC PHILATELY - Contd.

10. Presentation

A. If the collector has no intention to take part into philatelic exhibitions any arrangement of the material will be suitable.

Anyway it is recommended to store the material in a "stock book" type of album following the plan inserting small paper labels with thematic information. It is also recommended to keep note of the main reasons relating each item to the theme, especially when it is the output of a personal study.

- B. If the philatelist decides to "Mount" the collection he has to choose the type of sheets.
 - Type of Paper

Hard enough to support the items (envelopes, etc.)

Flexible enough to use typewriting, (Eraser) should not damage it.

- commercial or specially made?

For the first preparation commercial sheets are alright, Free choice between plain or squared colour should not disturb (clear, soft.)

Better to use a standard format (check availability of protection covers in transparent plastic).

C. Writing

Any technique (hand, letraset, typewritten, printing, etc.) but clear, consistent, tidy

D. Mounting

Any kind of support but clear, consistent

E. The items should be arranged in the sheets in a "readable" form. Each page should contain enough items and should be balanced with the other pages.

The items should be in the sequence according to the thematic development (No graphic justification should change the thematic order.)

F. Non postal items cannot be used for presentation reason Exceptions.

Sketches or Maps.

If they improve the understanding (avoid a long description enlargements or pictures)

If strictly necessary (mainly for philatelic reasons, (ex, to show the back of a postcard, etc

G. Texts

Each chapter of the plan should start with a title. The same applies to each subchapter/paragraph.

A concise text should introduce and link together the items from a thematic standpoint

Additional short information should be provided any time the material is not self explanatory from a thematic philatelic point of view.

Main suggestions:

The collection should be read through the material (which is what we are collecting). Try to write as little as possible, but as much as needed for clear understanding.

H. Other hints:

- + do not superimpose items.
- = do not cut postal stationery. (If they are too big and of little interest but the cancellation, mount them in the back of the pages showing the postmark through a "window" cut in the sheet)
- + Remember that the presentation is for understanding all your work and appreciating it!
- + The plan page should reproduce the plan of the collection at a detailed level (not too much—one page should be enough for a normal sized collection)
- In order to give the list of contents of the collection, the plan should be written down as the index of a book, indicating as well the actual size of each chapter (in pencil, for easier updating).

11. Philatelic Exhibitions

- Why to exhibit?

to make propaganda for philately. to compete

to measure your achievements

to publicise the results of your research.

Competition is challenging, interesting and motivating but should not be the main target of your philatelic activities.

+ Where to exhibit?

There are different level of exhibitions:

Regional, national, international In some exhibitions there is no competition:

Participants are invited by the organizers.

For competition regulations / enrolment procedure are available through the philatelic organizers (address in the philatetic press)

+ What is a philatelic competition?

It is an overall evaluation of the collection in points. According to the pointage: A prize (medal) is awarded/level of points needed to get the same type of medal is higher in Higher rank exhibitions (national, international).

12. Regulation:

- + Are the evaluation, Criteria of a thematic collection.
- + Reflect the suggestions given in the previous pages.
- Are prepared by the most advanced collections in the field at international level in the thematic commission of the international federation of philately.
- + Are modified from time to time in order to reflect the advancement achievements in the latest years.
- + In the exhibitions organised by philatelic societies active in the FIP environment, these regulations are always in force.

THE EDUCATIONAL VALUE OF STAMPS

The story of evolution is the story of human progress and civilization. Empires rose to greatness and like 'chimney sweepers turned to dust' but the chronicles of their glory their power and influence have come down to us through the corridore of time. Ruling kings, poets, philosophers, navigators, explorers, scientists and inventors and along with them the memorable events of the age including victories, festivals, jubilees, inaugurations and achievements have all been fittingly honoured in all modern countries. These are all depicted in the adhesive pieces of paper known as stamps. The hobby of stamp collecting instils in one the urge to acquire knowledge of finer tastes and likings, in the instinct for the preference of the tender, the beautiful, the gay and the artistically perfect articles we should like to eniov.

The dignity and eminece of a country may be gauged from her potage stamps and in this respect India admittedly stands supreme. India presents a galary of postage stamps noted both for their beauty of design and colour and for their educative value. They extend from a chronicle of events and indigenous occupations to reigns of Kings and Queens, lives of sages, saints, poets, scientists, industrialists, important historical events like the mutiny, the Telegraph Centenary, the Indian Railway Centenary the Olympic Games, the temples, the flora and fauna, five year plans, High Courts and universities, miniature paintings and a host of other subjects. They are some of the finest specimens of colour and art. Philately has honoured the father of Nation, Mahatma Gandhi, the Prime Minister Statesman, our beloved Pandit Jawaharlalji, saints like Kabir and St. Thomas, poets like Tagore and Ghalib, philosophers like Swamy Vivekananda, educationists like Dr Maria Montessori, Industrialists like Sir Jamshedji Tata, Engineers like Dr Visvesvaraya, politicians like Motilal Nehruji, Mathematicians like Ramanujam, Scientists like Haffkine and Madame Curie, Musicians like Beathoven, Cricketers like Raniit Singhii and many others. Their lives are portrayed in the beautiful folders brougt out by the Indian Posts and Telergaphs Department.

It may be of interest to observe that Portugal issued stamps depicting the story of the Great Navigator Vasco De-Gama's landing at Calicut and Argentina in 1892, and U S.A. in 1893 similarly commemorated the centenary of the discovery of America. So History speaks through stamps and imports to them an educative force. Curiously enough it fell to the

lot of a British school master, Rowland Hill, to agitate in 1835 for uniform postal rates which culminated in the birth of the postage stamp.

Geography fittingly claims the postage stamps as its educator on paper. The collector of stamps comes to know more of lands and the people of the world, Map stamps of the various countries help to visualise the location of the place in that little known portion of the world and are more vivid to the trained eye of the collector and linger longer in his memory than large sized wall maps. But stamps need not necessarily show maps to excite an interest in geography The collector sees stamps of South Africa, Angola, Niger, East Africa, Somali Land, Congo when he collects stamps of Africa. He begins to wonder how the various contries of Europe i.e Britain, Portugal, France, Germany, Italy and Belgium respectigot their colonies in Africa. If the collector has any curiosity at all, he will learn facts about the Boer war. The collector who has Vatican stamps has an understanding of the unique position of the Vatican that is probably not known by some of his non-collecting friends. For a Roman Catholic the collecting of stamps of Italy instils an urge to know the various Popes and Pontifs

Citizenship is the way people treat one another rather than mere knowledge about our Government, when better is citizenship learned than in the pursuit of this hobby? Arthur summerfield U.S. Postmaster General, truly said 'A Nations' postage stamps are a gallery of its glories. In miniature, they depict its famous men they enliven the great events of its history, they highlight its industries, they extol its natural wonders postage stamps are also ambassodors of goodwill. They show what a country stands for. They show where a people's heart is. They mirror the soul of a nation.' In this world of conflict and turmoil, these small pieces of paper are real messages of love and peace, and little silent 'ambassodors of a country.

Stamps properly studied, can have educational value in language. The collector who collects French stamps knows many French words before he even enters a French class. He knows that Holland is Dutch and Osterriech is Austria.

A stamp album is a compendium of History, Geography and Biography. It is a sociable past time What more will one want from philately than its silent joys and its gateway to the Temple of knowledge.

14. How to select the pages for exhibitions

In order to let the juror appricate the best rules of work you should select the pages which brings you the best evaluation for each item of the pointage scheme:

Best presented best developed Most original widest choices of items best philatelic items

But linking them in a continuous way, i.e., exhibiting full (or wide selection) chapter rather than saparate pages

Suggestions:

M

- + The plan should be that of the collection, not of the frames you exhibit
- + Do not modify your collection according to the number of frames you have obtained from the organizers

 Do not belive that the higher the number of frames, the better chances for success.

15 Conclusion

+ As any other good philately collection a thematic one requires personal engagement time and study and also money

You cannot built up a good collection in tew weeks or months with new issues or simple items.

- Without your research even the best items of classical philately support of the top express will help you very little.
- Your personal commitment will be rewarded with personal satisfaction and pleasure at philatelic and cultural level and if you decide to exhibit, with additional pleasure and, we wish you, the highest awards.

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
